

Jonathan Martin is the national political correspondent for *The New York Times* and a political analyst for CNN, where he appears regularly on *Inside Politics*. He has reported on a range of topics for the paper, including the 2016 presidential election, Capitol Hill leadership, party politics, and the 2014 midterm races.

Prior to joining *The New York Times* in 2013, he served as senior political writer and White House correspondent for *Politico* where he covered the 2008 and 2012 presidential campaigns from the inside, reporting on the candidates and their strategy with sharp insight based on his extensive contacts with the country's leading Democrats and Republicans. He was *Politico's* senior reporter in 2012, winning praise for breaking news, and his ahead-of-the-curve reporting and analysis on Mitt Romney and President Barack Obama.

As one of the first hires at *Politico*, he spent two years on the campaign trail writing about the historic 2008 race. After President Obama's election, Martin traveled as a White House correspondent across the country and overseas, covering the new Obama Administration and an array of historical events including the G-20 summit in London and a NATO summit in Strasbourg.

His career in journalism began at the *National Journal* where he reported for *The Hotline* on party politics and with the *National Review* magazine where he covered the aftermath of the 2006 midterm elections.

Mr. Martin, is a co-author of *The New York Times* best seller "*The End of the Line: Romney vs. Obama: The 34 Days That Decided the Election*" (December 2012), which provided an unprecedented minute-by-minute account of the 2012 race for the White House.

Additionally, his work has been featured in *The New Republic*, *The Washington Post*, *The Wall Street Journal* and *The New York Times Magazine*. He has appeared to offer political analysis on a variety of TV and radio networks, including CNN, MSNBC, NPR, PBS, ABC, CBS and NBC.

Originally from Arlington, Virginia, Mr. Martin graduated from Hampden-Sydney College with a Bachelor of Arts in History. He has visited 48 states in his career and is eager to make it to all 50.
